or negotiation over terms and conditions of employment. As a duly 7. appointed body exercising powers granted under the laws of the State 8. of New Jersey, the Board undertakes and agrees that it will not 9. directly or indirectly deprive, discourage, coerce or harass any 10. faculty member of the enjoyment of any rights conferred by this Act 11. or other laws of New Jersey or the Constitutions of New Jersey and 12. of the United States; that it will not discriminate against any 13. faculty member with respect to hours, wages, or any terms of 14. conditions of employment by reason of his membership in the Organi-15. 16. zation.

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- B. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to deny or restrict, to any faculty member, rights he may have under the General School Laws of the State of New Jersey or other applicable laws and regulations, including those of the State Department of Higher Education. The rights granted to faculty hereunder shall be deemed to be in addition to those provided elsewhere.
- C. The Organization and its representatives shall have the right to use the College facilities for meetings only when said use does not interfere with the operation of the College.
- D. Duly authorized representatives of the Organization shall be permitted to transact official Organization business on College property, provided that such activity does not interfere with the operation of the College or the performance of their regular duties.
- 30. E. The Organization shall have the right to use College facilities and equipment, including typewriters, mimeographing machines, other duplicating equipment, calculating machines, and all types of audio-visual equipment at all reasonable times, when such equipment is not otherwise

is use. Payment shall be made for any expendable supplies used for Organization purposes and the Organization shall be liable for damages to any equipment used for said purposes.

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F. The Organization shall have the right to post notices of its activities and matters of organization concern on faculty bulletin boards; additional boards, where needed, will be provided by the College at Organization request. The Organization may use the College mail service and faculty mail boxes for communications, including faculty-wide distribution.

The Board of Trustees and the Faculty Organization agree upon the following concept of Academic Freedom:

- 1. The teacher is entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to the adequate performance of his other academic duties; but research for pecuniary return shall be based upon an understanding with authorities of the institution.
- 2. The teacher is entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing his subject, but he should be careful not to introduce into his teaching controversial matter which has no relation to his subject. Limitations of academic freedom because of religious or other aims of the institution should be clearly stated in writing at the time of the appointment.
 - Real Resolutions of the college or university teacher is a citizen, a member of a learned profession, and an officer of an educational institution. When he speaks or writes as a citizen, he shall be free from institutional censorship or discipline, but his special position in the community imposes special obligations. As a man of learning and an educational officer, he should remember that the public may

judge his profession and his institution by his utterances. Hence
he should at all times be accurate, should exercise appropriate
restraint, should show respect for the opinions of others, and
should make every effort to indicate that he is not an institutional
spokesman.

4. Every appointment shall be stated in writing and be in the possession of both institution and teacher before the appointment is consummated.

All faculty member evaluations will be discussed with the faculty member and signed by him acknowledging discussion prior to being placed in his file. Any such material may be answered by the faculty member and such answer shall be attached to the evaluation in the file. It is the responsibility of supervisory personnel to call a faculty member's attention to any information received by supervisory personnel regarding the faculty member which may be deemed to be derogatory or critical in nature.

H. Vacancies

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- 1. The faculty shall be alerted to any professional position vacancy, including administrative, teaching, or academic support positions.

 Such notice shall include duties and a statement of required qualifications.
- 2. All present faculty members who apply for any professional position shall be notified of the disposition of their application prior to the publication of the name of the successful applicant.
- I. The provisions of this Agreement and the wages, hours, terms, and conditions of employment shall be applied in a manner which is not arbitrary, capricious, or discriminatory and is without regard to race,

creed, religion, color, national origin, age, sex, or marital status.

ARTICLE III 1. CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT 2. Basic Load 3. Full-time teaching faculty shall teach fifteen (15) or sixteen (16) 4. contact hours for each registration period, with overload compen-5. sation at appropriate rates for each additional contact hour. 6. (N.B. Actual practice on this campus is to consider the normal 7. or standard teaching load to be 15 or 16 contact hours, the former 8. if entirely lecture courses, the latter if it includes laboratories, 9. studio sessions, etc. The actual workload of individual faculty 10. members should be a joint decision made by the faculty member 11. involved, and the administration. A workload reduction or over-12. load compensation for faculty members with special projects or 13. assignments may be considered as needed. 14. No instructor shall be assigned more than a five (5) day 15. 2. work week. 16. No workday should exceed eight (8) hours. 17. No late evening classes should be followed by an early morn-18. ing class. 19. There shall not be any extended "break" during the normal d, 20. workday. For example: by a scheduled 8:30 class and a 21. 3:30 class with no classes scheduled in-between. 22. If a faculty member requests a deviation of these conditions, 23. extra compensation shall not be made. 24. The workday shall not extend into more than two (2) evenings.

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26. 3. No full-time faculty member shall hold other full-time employment during the term of his contract period.

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- 4. A contact hour is an hour which comprises one fifty-minute class meeting per week for the fifteen weeks that comprise the instructional part of a semester, which is a regularly scheduled group meeting of the class, lecture, laboratory, studio, seminar, shop, etc.
- 5. A faculty member may be expected to serve on one major college or faculty committee. No faculty member shall be required to advise, counsel, or coach more than one major college or student activity.
- 6. Members of the unit on a twelve (12) month contract shall receive a minimum 20 per cent pay differential over the academic-year salary for their rank and step; they shall work a maximum of 35 hours per week over five (5) days, and shall work no more than seven (7) hours in any day.
- assignments in their area of competence before any additional summer faculty is hired. Any full-time faculty member accepting a summer assignment from the College shall be guaranteed appropriate employment and/or compensation at the appropriate rates for one of the sections assigned to him. If a promotion in rank has been achieved by June 1 of any year, summer pay for that year will be based upon the new higher rank.
- 8. In most cases full-time faculty will be given the opportunity for additional teaching assignments in their area of competence before any additional part-time faculty is hired.

3. Maternity Leave

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n. Maternity leave from the mid-point of pregnancy or upon recommendation of a female faculty member's physician shall be granted for a period of up to one year. The Board may extend such leave beyond the one-year period. Upon return from such leave, a faculty member shall be placed at the same point on the salary guide which she would have attained had she taught at the College during this period.

B. Admission to Courses

Faculty members and their dependents, including husband, wife,
 and children, are to be granted tuition-free entrance for credit
 or audit to any courses offered by the College.

C. Health Insurance

1. Participating in the New Jersey State Health Benefits Plans shall be non-contributory, the College assuming the entire cost, with coverage of dependents, including children up to age twenty-three. This coverage is Blue Cross hospitalization, Blue Shield medical and surgical, extended coverage, and Prudential major medical or equal coverage.

44. D. Payroll Checks
45. Faculty members will have the option to be paid either on a ten-month
46. or twelve-month basis. Pay days occur every other Friday, with adjust47. ments for holidays, according to a pay day schedule issued by the
48. Business Office.

1. ARTICLE V
2. GRIEVANCE FROCEDURE

A. Definition of a Grievance

A grievance is a claim or complaint by one or more members of the bargaining unit or by the Organization, hereinafter collectively referred to as a "grievant", based upon an alleged violation, misrepresentation or misapplication of any provision of this Agreement, or any existing rule, order or regulation of the Board of Trustees, the President of the College or the Board of Higher Education.

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10. B. Procedure

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In the event a Grievant invokes this Grievance Procedure, the grievant shall:

- 1. Reduce the grievance to writing in letter form and said letter shall be mailed or delivered to the Division Chairman, the appropriate Dean, the President of the College, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees. The letter shall simply state the nature of the grievance and the remedy requested. Said letter shall be dated and signed by the grievant.
- 2. Within seven (7) calendar days from the receipt of said writing, the Division Chairman shall meet with the grievant and shall discuss the facts and circumstances of the grievance, in an

effort to resolve the grievance. The Division Chairman shall indicate his disposition of the grievance, in writing, within seven (7) school days of the last meeting with the grievant.

A copy of said writing shall be mailed or delivered to the grievant, the appropriate Dean, the President of the College

and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

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3. If the grievant is not satisfied with the disposition of the grievance by the Division Chairman, he may appeal to the appropriate Dean within seven (7) calendar days from the receipt of written disposition of the grievance by the Division Chairman, by notifying the appropriate Dean of said appeal in writing and forwarding copies of said written appeal to the Division Chairman, the President of the College and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

- 4. Within seven (7) calendar days from the receipt of the written appeal, the appropriate Dean shall meet with the grievant and they shall discuss the facts and circumstances of the grievance in an effort to resolve the grievance. The appropriate Dean shall indicate his disposition of the grievance in writing, within seven (7) school days of the last meeting with the grievant. A copy of said written disposition shall be mailed or delivered to those persons to whom the written grievance was mailed or delivered.
- 5. If the grievant is not satisfied with the disposition of the grievance by the appropriate Dean, he may appeal to the President of the College, within seven (7) calendar days from the receipt of the written disposition of the appropriate Dean by notifying the President of said appeal in writing, and copies of said written

appeal shall be mailed or delivered to those persons to whom the 49. written grievance was mailed or delivered. 50.

> The President of the College shall, within seven (7) days from 6. receipt of said written appeal, meet with the grievant and shall discuss the facts and circumstances of the grievance with said grievant in an effort to resolve the matter. The President shall indicate his disposition of the grievence in writing, within seven (7) school days of the last meeting with the grievant. A copy of said writing shall be mailed or delivered to those persons to whom the written grievance was mailed or delivered. The President may designate a representative to process and deter-

mine the grievance, and the disposition of the grievance by the President shall be final.

OR.

If the grievant is not satisfied with the disposition of the grievance by the President, the grievance may be submitted by the grievant to arbitration before an impartial arbitrator within thirty (30) days. If the parties cannot agree on an arbitrator, he shall be selected pursuant to the rules and procedure of the American Arbitration Association whose rules shall likewise govern the arbitration proceeding. The College and the grievant shall not be permitted to assert in such arbitration proceeding any ground or to rely on evidence not previously disclosed to the other party. The arbitrator shall have no power to alter, add to or subtract from the terms of the Agreement. Both parties agree that the arbitration shall be advisory.

The fees and expenses of the arbitrator shall be shared equally 8.

1. ARTICLE VII

2. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Any physical examination required by law or by the College shall be paid for by the Board. If, at the faculty member's option, he chooses his own physician, he shall pay for same. Free tuberculosis testing shall be provided annually to all faculty members.
- 7. B. Copies of this Agreement shall be reproduced by the Board and distribu8. ted to all faculty members now employed or hereafter employed by the
 9. Board during the duration of this Agreement.

- 10. C. If any provision of this Agreement or any application of this Agreement to any faculty member or group of faculty members shall be found contrary to law, then such provision or application shall not be deemed valid and subsisting except to the extent permitted by law, but all other provisions or applications of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.
- D. This Agreement shall be subject to ratification by members of the Crganization and by the members of the Board of Trustees.

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- E. Except as this Agreement shall hereinafter otherwise provide, all terms and conditions of employment applicable on the effective date of this Agreement to employees covered by this Agreement as established by the rules, regulations, and/or policies of the Board in force on said date, shall continue to be so applicable during the terms of this Agreement. Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, nothing contained herein, shall be interpreted and/or applied so to eliminate, reduce or otherwise detract from any faculty benefit existing prior to its effective date. This Agreement shall supersede all previous Board or College policies on those matters. The reference to the law is "Section 34: 13A-P.L., of Public Law 303, Laws of 1968."
- 29. F. This Agreement incorporates the entire understanding of the parties on 30. all matters which were or could have been the subject of negotiation.

ARTICLE VIII

DURATION OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall be effective from July 1, 1971, and shall continue in effect until June 30, 1972, unless the Organization and the Board mutually agree in writing to an extension of its duration.
